

In today's economy, communities are looking for effective ways to create and maintain jobs, spur quality development and do more with fewer resources. The need to connect community planning and economic development is stronger than ever. The Community Builders Leadership Institute (CBLI) is a training to help local leaders respond to the changing economic landscape, and build stronger, more successful communities.

Over two and a half days, up to seven community teams of six to eight participants will participate in a hands-on workshop to build leadership and practical understanding of ways to align community planning and economic development in today's economy.

Working with experts in local finance, housing, land use, transportation and economic development, teams will gain practical knowledge on the nuts-and-bolts of building stronger communities. Participants will leave the CBLI with a better understanding of ways to align community planning and economic development, lessons learned from successful projects, and a clear plan of action for next steps in their community.

This training will help participating community leaders understand:

- The role of sound community planning and design in reaching economic goals
- Key trends and issues affecting Western Colorado's communities and economy
- Specific action steps communities can take for long-term success
- Cost savings by improving land-use planning, transportation and building practices
- Effective public and private partnerships to leverage community goals

AGENDA AT A GLANCE

The Community Builders Leadership Institute combines topical training sessions and informative success stories with group discussion and team-based action planning.

Day 1 will focus on socioeconomic, demographic and market trends that are affecting communities in western Colorado. Teams will also discuss what outcomes they hope to achieve in their communities with the information they learn, and how they can create an action plan that helps pave they way towards meeting those goals. The day will conclude with a welcome reception and keynote address.

Day 2 will dive into specific topics at the nexus of community planning and economic development, including local finance, housing and transportation choices, jobs and economic development, and community revitalization. In addition, Day 2 will feature a variety of case study examples illustrating what it took to get successful projects off the ground.

Day 3 is all about how teams can make use of what they gain in the course. Teams will work together and with the training team to finalize local action plans, which will outline specific near-term goals and next steps to undertake when the team gets home.

During the course of the CBLI, community leaders will:

- Learn about successful projects and programs from peer communities.
- Connect to a network of local leaders and peer communities throughout the region.
- Develop strategies for public engagement and effective community partnerships.
- Work with a team of expert coaches to address specific planning and development challenges within their community.
- Create a community action plan to advance specific issues and goals identified in the CBLI.

WHO CAN APPLY?

The Community Builders Leadership Institute is open to towns, cities and counties from throughout Western Colorado. Up to seven teams will be selected to participate, with each team ranging from six to eight members. Teams must demonstrate a commitment to connecting local planning and economic development goals.

We believe a broad spectrum of community leaders is necessary for successful decision-making. Creating a leadership team is the first step in developing partnerships in your community. Our experience has found that a diverse, broad-based team is most effective in engaging fellow community members.



SELECTION CRITERIA

Teams will be evaluated based on:

- Strong team composition;
- Ability to demonstrate how the CBLI can support development and/or implementation of an upcoming or current community planning and/or economic development effort;
- Local commitment to advancing livability and economic development goals through sound community planning, development and investment.

Creating a leadership team is critical to a successful application, and the composition of the team is key. Teams should include a broad range of perspectives and expertise from the public and private sectors. The list below includes several types of representation to consider in building a well-rounded team.

- Local government (elected and appointed officials, city/county managers, planners, public works)
- Business and economic development (Chambers, Economic Development Organizations, Downtown Development Authority, Main Street Programs, etc)
- Community development organizations (housing, youth/education, civic organizations)
- Real estate, development and investment professionals (developers, realtors, local lenders)

COSTS

All training material, lodging and meal costs will be covered for participants by the Sonoran Institute through scholarship. Absent of this scholarship, the cost per individual to attend this two-and-a-half day training is \$400. Participating teams are expected to pay for individual travel to and from the CBLI.

APPLICATION PROCESS

The Community Builders Leadership Institute will begin at noon on Wednesday, January 15th and end at 3:00pm on Friday, January 17th. Applications are due by close of business on Friday, November 27th.

The Sonoran Institute will evaluate applications for thoroughness and demonstrated commitment to community planning and economic development.
